

REPLICA SPUDDER COMES TO LIFE

The 1923 Fort Worth Spudder Super D & steam traction engine is precisely made to a 1/6 scale.

It was manufactured by Roger Lawrence, a professional machinist, who had a hobby machine shop at his home in Bloomfield, NM. In addition to working full time, he spent up to 40 hours a week on the steam traction engine at home after work and on weekends, taking him four years to complete the working coal/wood fired engine.

Shortly after completing the engine, he retired and began working on the Fort Worth Spudder Super D drilling rig. A museum in Aztec, NM had a Spudder set up for display and Lawrence began taking picture and measurements and would return home to work on the design and construction. As he was working on the derrick, he contacted his friend, Dick Heath, and asked him to get help measurements at the top of the tower, as he

was afraid to climb it. Heath contacted the city to bring a bucket truck and they were able to obtain the needed information.

As the drilling rig was nearing 95% completion, Lawrence was killed in an accident. Heath offered to purchase, complete and show the model. He had worked on a similar rig in 1950. He completed the Spudder and then built a truck and wagon commonly found at well sites of that time period. Heath enjoyed running the model at shows and other events for many

years and had it on display at the Farmington, NM Museum for 2 years.

In 2014, Heath and his wife, Mona, were visiting family in Saint Jo and saw the Wichita Spudder on display at the Tales and Trails Museum. At that time, they felt their model would fit nicely in the museum and began talking to the board of directors about donating the model for a permanent display. The Fort Worth Spudder and steam



traction engine will now be on display for others to learn about, appreciate and enjoy this important part of drilling history. Come see it run on the 4th Saturday of each month!

BILL TAYLOR, IN HOUSE RESTORATION AND FRAMING

Bill Taylor's art career started at the age of 7 with instruction from Mrs. Connie Arveson in Nocona. From that base, he went on to graduate from the Dallas Art Institute in 1972. For over 27 years, Bill engaged in a back-breaking labor of love as a stone mason and landscape artist. His stonework and waterfall construction at the Benton Place Inn in Eureka Springs won first place in a national competition. "America in Blooms," is still a featured landscape of Eureka Springs. Bill's stone projects can be found throughout north-west Arkansas and south-



eastern Missouri. Bill began a second career in custom framing and art restoration in 1972, apprenticing at the Sanger Harris Department store. He soon moved on to custom framing at Newman Galleries in Dallas. He also did custom framing for Manheim Galleries, shipping custom work to Houston and New York

City, and later at The Frame House and Dutch Art Gallery in Dallas. HE has a career in custom framing spanning over 23 years. Several years ago, Bill moved back home to Nocona and has been volunteering at Tales 'N' Trails Museum in Nocona doing art restoration and custom framing for the museum.
