


Thank you to volunteer Carol Luton who graciously made our table runners to compliment our "Patriotism" theme for this year's shebang! The tables were beautiful!

# Texas Archaeology Month



October is Texas Archaeology Month! What is archaeology? It is the study of human history and prehistory through the excavation of sites and the analysis of artifacts and other physical remains.

Did you know that Tales 'N' Trails Museum has a lot of archaeological artifacts from Texas? Joe Benton paid people (mostly kids needing spending money) to pick up anything they found around Spanish Fort and Red River Station since there were findings that there had been a lot of Native American activity along the Red River. When he died in 1958, Mr. Benton had amassed one of the largest collections from one geographic area. We have a large sampling of his collection on display.

The oldest artifacts have been known to be from the Paleo era, roughly 15,000 - 8,000 years ago! But now Texas archaeologists are finding pieces dating back even farther! This period doesn't even have a name yet!

The Native Americans used mainly different types of stone to make their points and tools of all kinds. After the appearance of Europeans in North America, they taught themselves to make things out of metal which they got from the white man's guns, pots, bridles, etc. Since metal disintegrated, metal points are hard to find. But Joe Benton had so many of them that they are actually called "Benton Points" after him!

Native Americans made all their points using primarily other stones and the tips of antlers. They were quite the craftsmen! They also made tools out of animal bones.

With today's technology, archaeologists can tell a lot more about artifacts they find, not only about the age and origin of the piece, but hints as to how the people who made them lived. Visit the museum and check out some of our Texas Archaeology!
